JOHN HARRIS AWARD

1. The John Harris Award, established in 1961, is presented by the Association in recognition of notable published work, such as in the bibliographical, critical, historical or administrative fields, which represent a contribution to New Zealand librarianship.
2. There is no restriction on the number of awards, but they are made sparingly.
3. There is no restriction on the length of the written work.
4. The scope of the study should be reasonably specific.
5. The study should be the result of original research.
6. A work published within the previous three years may be submitted either by the author(s) or by another person, with the author's consent. Nominations for works to be considered for the award should be in the hands of the Registrar by the first day of July in any year.
7. For each work submitted, the Council shall appoint not less than three assessors, chosen with regard to the particular field in which the work has been done. Any person who has submitted a work shall not be appointed an assessor. Any person, who in the opinion of the Council has given material assistance to the work shall not be appointed an assessor. The recommendation of the assessors shall be forwarded to the Council, who shall make the award in terms of the recommendation of the assessors. The Council after considering the recommendation of the assessors may decide that no award shall be made.
8. The John Harris Award consists of an appropriate diploma, and a sum of money
