Cataloguer profiles

Natalie Williams

I'm a Collection Description Librarian in one of the monographs teams at the National Library of New Zealand in Wellington. I've been in this role for about four years but have been at the Library for much longer. I previously worked in the <u>Music Hire Service</u> which hires out sets of sheet music to choirs and orchestras across the country. I had never worked in a library when I started in the Hire Service, I had a Bachelor of Music in classical singing and was lucky to have found a job that involved music. Eventually I decided to commit to being a librarian and completed the Postgraduate Diploma in



Information Studies at Victoria University. I really enjoy cataloguing as it lets me use my attention to detail and problem solving skills.

Although my current role isn't specifically a music role I've naturally gravitated towards it. I catalogue physical and digital music scores and sound recordings, as well as adult and juvenile monographs. I also create authority records for personal names for NACO and am one of the administrators for the <u>Cataloguing in Publication (CiP) service</u>.

Recently I've been cataloguing a lot of 78 rpm shellac discs. These were precursors to vinyl discs and the ones I've catalogued range in date from the 1910s to the 1950s. It's been really interesting learning more about New Zealand music over the years, becoming familiar with some of the big names and the different styles of music that were popular. These styles included cowboy music, whistling, yodelling, Hawaiian music and square dance music! For example, I've catalogued a few discs with music by Ronnie Ronalde, the famous singer and whistler, including <u>Song of the mountains ; If I were a</u> <u>blackbird / Ronnie Ronalde, singing and whistling with orchestra</u>. Check out "If I were a blackbird" on YouTube and compare your whistling skills!

Discovery layers and making them work for you, sometimes

Do you ever have queries from library users about why second-listed co-authors are relegated to the "other" section of the catalogue record in your discovery layer?

At Wellington City Libraries we recently had two of these in the space of a couple of weeks. The library users have a sound case: a work can have more than one creator, so why does this appear not to be the case? The limitations of MARC make decreasing amounts of sense in Googly-looking discovery layers, and it's very hard to compose a reply to a library user without delving into arcane history and sounding frankly peculiar.

A quick scan of discovery layers shows a variety of methods of describing and sorting creators and contributors, under a variety of headings. For example, a co-author can be a "contributor", an "other author", an "added author". They can be listed in fairly close proximity to the nominated author, or they can be scrolling distance away. There are several issues: a library user shouldn't need to understand the reasoning behind the first listed creator being treated differently from subsequent creators. Having creators listed under different headings suggests they have different roles when this isn't necessarily the case. Finally (pedantically), the default term "author" doesn't describe the role of other types of creator; it doesn't work for music or art for example. This all feels sub-optimal.

At Wellington City Libraries we have a complicated relationship with our discovery layer, with many of its features outside our control. We do however have capacity to customise sections of our display, so we recently decided to make a concerted effort to see what we could do to better reflect the roles of creators.

A couple of wise people suggested we didn't need to make a distinction between 1XX and 7XX fields in our display. RDA does not make this distinction, and we don't need to remain "loyal" to MARC. This idea felt like a minor liberation, so we went away and experimented to see what merging these fields would look like; effectively doing away with a "main entry".

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Discovery layers and making them work for you, sometimes

Half the battle was coming up with a heading to describe the resulting list that would make sense to library users. In most catalogues, the heading for the 1XX is "Author", and "Other Entries" for the 7XX. We had already changed these to "Creator" and "Contributor (s)" to better reflect the types of material in our collection. Bearing in mind the 7XXs also include contained works, sequels, prequels, and other relationships, we settled on "Creator(s), Contributor(s), Connected works". Under this heading the roles of the Subfields E (Relator Term) and I (Relationship Information) are much more important in explaining who's who and what's what. (The fact that our AACR2 and other legacy records do not contain this information is on our radar as an issue for another day.)

The following illustrates our tweaked grouping of fields:

The result displays in this way for a book with more than one author:

Creator(s), Contributor(s), Connected works Picoult, Jodi, 1966- author. Boylan, Jennifer Finney, 1958- author.

Subject(s)

For works with multiple contributor types we are seeing the benefit of being able to display the Subfield E Relator Terms in our discovery layer as well:

Creator(s), Contributor(s), Connected works King, Paul, 1978- film director, screenwriter. Heyman, David, 1961- film producer. Farnaby, Simon screenwriter. Whishaw, Ben, 1980- voice actor. Bonneville, Hugh actor. Hawkins, Sally actor. Capaldi, Peter actor. Walters, Julie, 1950- actor. Grant, Hugh, 1960- actor. Bond, Michael creator. Heyday Films production company.

We are on the lookout for other ways to reflect RDA records better. Additionally, there are other quirks we live with, work around, or are hoping to address with our LMS supplier; it is a work in progress! For example, we do still have a pared-back main entry in the title banner for each record. If we had our way, this title banner would display only the 245 Title Statement in full; something for us to tackle next.

We are interested to hear how other libraries are working with discovery layers, and what obstacles you are overcoming and what improvements and enhancements are being made to the search experience.

And thank you to the wise heads for the encouragement to step outside the box a bit.
