

It has been an honour and privilege to be the LIANZA President. I am grateful to you all and extend my heartfelt thanks.

I begin my annual report in te reo Māori and te reo Māori Kūki 'Āirani. As the first Pasifika president of Te Rau Herenga o Aotearoa LIANZA and as a person on a lifelong reo learning journey, I wanted to acknowledge my kōpu tangata whānau family in my Dad's reo, with the help of my teacher Manapori Va'ine, Meitaki.

My presidential journey has some parallels to learning te reo. Variously, imperfect, a challenge, a joy, a commitment and most of all achieved only with the support of many.

This year's membership of the LIANZA Council represented the transition phase of the governance structure change. But significantly, in a mutually agreed decision, this year our partner since 1995, Te Rōpū Whakahau,

no longer had representation at the Council table. As I came into office, an important commitment was to work with Council and Te Rōpū Whakahau to reset our partnership and work on understanding how to be an exemplary Treaty partner. I am grateful to Carla Jeffrey, Cellia Joe-Olsen, Anahera Morehu and other Te Ropū Whakahau members who have supported and guided the korero on indigenous matters and Māoriled mahi. We continue this work, and I hope the current president, Richard Misilei, can sign a new partnership agreement over 2023-2024.

My presidential year was bookended firstly by an invitation to unveil the new name for the AUT library Te Mātāpuna, and lastly with a hybrid ceremony to pass the presidential pounamu to Richard Misilei attended by colleagues, friends, whānau, aiga. In between, it was an absolute privilege to be invited to speak at and attend various webinars, seminars, symposiums, events and gatherings organised by both LIANZA and IFLA and to meet many colleagues. There were retirements and some memorial services, and many stalwart and steadfast professionals who have contributed so much were acknowledged and celebrated.



Ana Pickering's final executive director report details some of this year's significant achievements. I won't list those important pieces of work again. But I want to thank Ana for her thorough, thoughtful, committed, hardworking and responsible leadership of the association. She was consistently responsive, and robust conversations were the norm. We wish her the very best in her new endeavours and thank her for her contribution to LIANZA. Meitaki ma'ata Ana.

Looking back over July 2022 to June 2023, many of us may immediately think about the impacts of weather events on the country. Just as during the COVID pandemic, members of our sector used library and information skills to help in community engagement. information dissemination, collections disaster management and welfare calls. I am pleased LIANZA has a new standing committee on climate action. I spoke at an IFLA MLAS Webinar on the 'UN Sustainable Development Goals and LIANZA' and attended an IFLA Asia-Oceania summit on the SDGs. Richard Misilei presented at DevNet2022 on the SDGs alongside colleagues from libraries in Samoa and Fiji. We both wanted to continue the SDG work past president Paula Eskett championed, as it has become even more relevant this year.

A key piece of our new strategic plan is working with LIANZA PIMN (Pacific Information Management Network), Pacific Libraries Network and librarians in the Pacific. This includes SDG work and other climate-related initiatives relevant to libraries. As a new IFLA Asia-Oceania Regional Committee member, I hope to support some of that mahi and share the connection as previous chair Winston Roberts did this year.

Our advocacy work this year is shown in the executive director report. A huge thanks to those librarians who used their expertise to help us prepare submissions and letters. To all the chairs and members of working groups, standing committees, regional committees, the Professional Registration Board, Credentials Committee and special interest communities, I extend gratitude for your participation and mahi. The grace with which people gift their time and expertise to LIANZA is humbling and very much appreciated. LIANZA does not take any of it for granted and we realise the association's sustainability cannot depend only on goodwill.

We know we don't stand alone. Our relationships and collaboration with other library associations and the wider GLAMMIR sector are immensely important to nurture, grow and maintain together.

As we look forward to a future involving the long-awaited embrace of increased indigenisation in our spaces and the challenges posed by disinformation, Artificial Intelligence, internet governance, climate change and the sustainability of our profession, we must remain connected and vigilant.

I am grateful for the wisdom and support from LIANZA PIMN, LIANZA Council, LIANZA Office, colleagues and several past presidents. Finally, as I said in te reo Māori Kuki Āirani in the opening passage, it has been an honour and privilege to be the LIANZA President. I am grateful to everyone and extend my heartfelt thanks.

FROM LIANZA EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR



It has been a busy year for LIANZA with new and ongoing projects, a strategic plan review, and the delivery of professional events. We have ensured that the sector's voice is heard on issues of importance. This is my final annual report, and it has been heartening to hear from members that they feel the reach and relevance of LIANZA has grown and they see the value of membership.

NEW STRATEGIC PLAN 2023-26

LIANZA Council began work on a new strategic plan at the end of June 2022 with six facilitated meetings. Focus groups included regional input with member and non-member groups providing valuable feedback to inform the development of the strategy. The draft strategy was finalised by the LIANZA Council for consultation by the end of July. Six regional and three online hui were attended by 78 members during October and their feedback was considered by LIANZA Council. The draft strategy was sent to stakeholders and Te Rōpū Whakahau for feedback prior to being finalised in early June 2023.

LIANZA SLANZA TERTIARY GRANTS

New Zealand Library Partnership Programme Strategic Partnership funding was awarded to LIANZA and SLANZA (School Library Association of New Zealand Aotearoa Te Puna Whare Mātauranga a Kura) to deliver tertiary grants. The joint initiative began in July 2021 with the first round of funding distributed in March 2022. The funding aims to attract new people to the library and information sector, upskill the current workforce, and provide a qualification uplift to help the workforce become qualified and future-ready.

In the first two funding rounds, 100 applications were made. Nearly \$500,000 was allocated to 82 successful applicants to cover tuition and other costs for tertiary library and information qualifications.

To date grants have been made across three tertiary institutions: Te Herenga Waka - Victoria University of Wellington, Te Pūkenga Open Polytechnic and Te Wānanga o Raukawa. Four students have completed their qualification and 10 have withdrawn, with 73 students studying in 2023. The majority of students are studying for the New Zealand Diploma of Library

and Information Studies Level 5 or the first year of the Bachelor of Library and Information Studies at Te Pūkenga Open Polytechnic. There are 21 students studying post-graduate qualifications at Te Herenga Waka Victoria University of Wellington. Two more funding rounds are planned in October 2023 and 2024, with the aim of allocating funding by mid-2025. There is more than \$500,000 available for applicants to gain support to start library and information qualifications.

Thanks again to the LIANZA SLANZA Tertiary Grants Project Advisory Group for their voluntary work and huge commitment to this project, especially Philip Miles who has been the chair since June 2022 and Kimberley Symon for her valued input into financial processes and forecasting.

EVALUATION AND IMPACT

The fourth LIANZA Evaluation and Impact cohort finished in October 2022. Over 96 people were involved in the four cohorts from across the library and information sector, with 37 case studies captured and shared in the LIANZA Evaluation and Impact 2021-22 Case Studies.

NEW ZEALAND BOOK AWARDS FOR CHILDREN AND YOUNG ADULTS

LIANZA offered opportunities for libraries to engage with the New Zealand Book Awards for Children and Young Adults, with the support of an NZLPP Strategic Partnership Grant. Books Alive events were created with finalist authors and illustrators by 13 public and school

libraries and 11 libraries shared the 'best of NZ children's literature' through virtual storytimes. Preparation for the third Books Alive programme began with a webinar in March 2022, with Books Alive events and virtual storytimes going live in late July-August 2022.

LIBRARIES AND THE FUTURE OF LOCAL GOVERNMENT

The LIANZA submission to the Review into the Future for Local Government was a major focus, with the establishment of a working group in October. LIANZA worked collaboratively with Public Libraries New Zealand (PLNZ) and Te Kahui Kaunihera ō Aotearoa Local Government New Zealand (LGNZ) as each organisation prepared individual submissions. LIANZA connected with Taituarā and the Association of Local Government Managers (ALGIM) during the development of the submission. The working group volunteered their time and expertise from late October until February and the final submission and infographic were provided for the sector to use. Thanks to all the members of the working group: Allison Dobbie (chair), Sue Sutherland, Amanda Cossham, Jenny Barnett, Debbie Duncan, Katie Brazil, Louise LaHatte, Rochelle Turnbull and Bernie Hawke.

LIANZA CONNECT

LIANZA Connect went live in June 2022 and was initially made available for LIANZA members only. Thanks to the people who helped to test the platform and act as ambassadors to facilitate discussion and sharing. LIANZA Connect was opened to the wider sector in January




platform. The number of user profiles created this year was 1368 with 348 active users, and 10 communities created. The platform offers professionals the opportunity to join communities packed with purpose. It is an online space to connect, share and access resources and join engaging discussions.

PROFESSIONAL EVENTS OFFERED

LIANZA continues to provide relevant and timely inperson and online events including LIANZA regional and special community events. The number of events continued to increase, with total event attendance increasing 244% from 2018, with a 40% decrease from the high attendance in 2021-22

Over the year LIANZA offered 46 events, regional communities offered six events and special interest communities offered 16 events.



LIANZA TEL SIG continues to be active with eight online events attended by 311 people over the year. LIANZA Te Upoko te Ika a Maui had a successful Library Assistant's Day in August 2022 with over 70 attendees and LIANZA

Te Whakakitenga aa Kaimai also had a Library Assistant Day in September 2022 with 35 attendees.

LIANZA Office held several well-attended online events. These included 'An Update on Ngā Upoko Tukutuku - Māori Metadata Project' with Te Rōpū Whakahau and National Library of New Zealand Te Puna Mātauranga o Aotearoa, with 120 registrants. A successful webinar on libraries and pay equity was offered with support of Te Pūkenga Here Tikanga Mahi Public Service Association (PSA), Te Hautū Kahurangi Tertiary Education Union (TEU), Te Riu Roa New Zealand Educational Institute (NZEI) with 182 participants.

TE TŌTARA

A funding proposal for Te Totara Capability Framework was successful and signed prior to the year-end. The framework was developed as a tool for strengthening a diverse library and information sector workforce by the New Zealand Partnership Programme (NZLPP).

The long-term sustainability of this framework and engagement of the library and information sector is vital to ensuring that it is embedded as a model for ongoing library workforce learning, development, and capability building.

This project will begin in 2023-24 and aims to build on learning from Te Whiria te Tangata, He Kupenga Horopounamu and Kāpiti Coast District Libraries. The project will evaluate Te Tōtara online learning, promote the framework and evaluate the opportunities and barriers for sector-wide implementation. This project will be led by LIANZA in close collaboration with other partners.

CLIMATE ACTION

At the IFLA World Library Congress in July 2022, Michael Peter Edson, a digital cultural strategist, challenged library and information professionals to act on climate change. In December 2022, LIANZA responded to this call to action by inviting members to join a LIANZA Climate Action Group, providing a space for library and information professionals to talk about how to take collective action on the climate crisis.

In two productive meetings, members overwhelmingly indicated their willingness to play a key part in securing a sustainable future for people and the planet. They discussed the challenges and opportunities for our profession to respond to climate change. The LIANZA Climate Action Group concluded that given the scale of the crisis and the degree of urgency required by our profession, a LIANZA Standing Committee on Climate Change was needed to demonstrate leadership and provide guidance to the sector. LIANZA Council approved the terms of reference for this new LIANZA standing committee prior to June 30.

ADVOCACY

LIANZA has advocated on behalf of the sector through submissions, letters, media and statements. These include:

- November 2022: Letter to Grey District Council on establishment of library manager
- August 2022: Letter to Ministers on digital inclusion and CAB petition
- July 2022: Letter to Minister on Data and Statistics Bill





FROM PROFESSIONAL REGISTRATION BOARD CHAIR

The LIANZA Professional Registration Board assess all applications for professional registration and revalidation, and advise on the LIANZA Professional Registration Scheme.

Mai i te kōpae ki te urupa, tātou ako tonu ai. From the cradle to the grave, we are forever learning.

The revalidation process invites us to take time to reflect on our growing capabilities and strengths. The quote above comes from **Te Tōtara Workforce Capability Framework** in the reflection and evaluation section, Te rau hinga The fallen leaves. This part of the capability framework notes that the ability to evaluate and share insights strengthens our own learning and helps lift the capability of the people around us. The process of professional registration and revalidation invites us to continue with our learning and document our progress.

MEMBERSHIP OF THE BOARD

We wish to acknowledge and thank two Board Chairs who stepped down from Board involvement last year.

After serving on the Board for seven years, two of which as Board Chair, Catherine Doughty from Te Herenga Waka Victoria University of Wellington decided to step down due to work and study demands. During her time on the Board Catherine was involved with education on reflective journal writing. Along with other Board members, Catherine ran online workshops and wrote pieces for *Te Rau Ora Library Life*. She mentored the Board members to become aware of reflective writing and how to recognise it, so we were all on the same page when reviewing journals. Catherine also led several sessions promoting LIANZA Professional Registration to librarians registered on the DIA **Stepping Up** teachers programme.

Adrian Jenkins from Te Pūkenga Unitec Institute of Technology, stepped into the Board chair role replacing Catherine Doughty. He served on the Board for a total of two and a half years, the final nine months as chair following Catherine's resignation.. During his time with the Board, he worked on producing a new template for Professional Registration Revalidation that encourages members to give the Board the type of information they need. He also established new, clearer policies for members who had let their Professional Registration lapse. Unfortunately, Adrian stepped down from all Board activities earlier this year due to health reasons.

As this report is compiled we are seeking one new member for the Board to join Amanda Bond (chair), Sharon Cornwall, Dianne Mears, Sarah Fraser, Jane Robinson and Melanie Brebner. For much of this year, we have been sharing the workload between us and I wish to acknowledge the generosity and dedication of the Board members as they give their own time to undertake this work. I wish to thank Catherine Doughty, Adrian Jenkins and former Board chair Cath Sheard who continue to offer support for the Board in their work.

REGISTRATION STATISTICS

In the 2022-23 year 18 new applications were processed and 101 journals were revalidated.

The total number of people registered under the scheme stands at 379. As work was done over the year on removing expired or lapsed members it shows a drop compared to last year.

FOCUS FOR 2023/24

The Board continues to work on:

- mentoring new Board members as they assess journals
- timely turn-around of revalidation journals
- ensuring the scheme meets the needs of the profession
- providing online 'meet-ups' to guide LIANZA members on how to submit successful journals.

FROM LIANZA COMMITTEES



A huge thank you to all committee members who invest and contribute significantly to the work of LIANZA on behalf of our members and the library and information sector.

LIANZA STANDING **COMMITTEE ON FREEDOM** OF INFORMATION

The LIANZA Standing Committee on Freedom of Information consists of Louise LaHatte (chair), Winston Roberts (Te Puna Mātauranga o Aotearoa National Library of New Zealand), Stephanie Colling (Bell Gully), Rob Cruickshank (Te Whare Wānanga o Waitaha University of Canterbury) and from March 2023 Marlies Zyp van der Laan (Auckland Libraries) replacing Laura Cook who resigned in September 2022.

Te Rau Ora Library Life continued to be a key communication tool, with articles written on a continuing basis to help answer queries. Topics were:

- Addressing the barriers we need to remove to deliver freedom of access to information equitably.
- Countering health misinformation with recommended resources by quest author Peter Murgatroyd from LIANZA Health SIG. Plus an update on censorship in Hong Kong.
- Guest author Zayna Hussien on behalf of Tohatoha writing on the programme in school libraries "That's a bit sus!" spotting and checking misinformation.
- Intellectual freedom and social justice.

- Book review: The Playbook: How to Deny Science, Sell Lies, And Make a Killing in The Corporate World, by Jennifer Jacquet.
- Al and libraries: Rob Cruickshank talked about AI and answered questions.

LIANZA Connect was also used to highlight Banned Books week, artificial intelligence and other topics.

A new guide on privacy in New Zealand along with FAQs was produced and published on the LIANZA website in October 2022.

The chair and committee members gave advice during the year to library staff dealing with challenged books. Books were again challenged for including misinformation on vaccines and misrepresentative histories of New Zealand detrimental to Māori. The chair gave local presentations on freedom of information versus harmful information and challenged books. Feedback was given to IFLA FAIFE on the UN Global Digital Compact response. Work started on a toolkit for public and school librarians for dealing with challenged books, with support from a review group from across the sector.

LIANZA STANDING **COMMITTEE ON COPYRIGHT**

The LSCC represents, advises and educates LIANZA's council and members on relevant copyright matters. We represent LIANZA views in submissions and advocacy work and educate members through regular communications. We also liaise with the wider GLAM sector and other relevant parties on copyright as required.

THE 2022-2023 YEAR

This year has been relatively quiet for the committee, and a consistent issue for members this year has been the struggle to find time for the committee's work.

The committee hosted an online Copyright Q and A session, which was well attended. The committee supported LIANZA in writing a briefing letter to the incoming Minister for Internal Affairs and presentations were made to LIAC, the Library and Information Advisory Commission. The Committee also provided columns for Te Rau Ora Library Life.

The committee has lost members during the year and is now once again at below-desired capacity. We would like to acknowledge and thank Alice Cruickshank and Nicola Harwood for their contributions to the work of the committee. Thanks



and acknowledgement also go to Melanie Johnson for her significant contribution as chair. We greatly appreciate her staying on as a committee member.

We welcomed Anna Rennie from the University of Auckland as chair, and Zoe Richardson continues to do sterling work as secretary of the committee. The committee has continued its close relationship with Tohatoha, with Michael Wolfe bringing a great deal of expertise to the committee. The appointment of ex-committee chair Sarah Powell to the position of Copyright Law and Policy Advisor, Australia Libraries and Archives Copyright Coalition (ALACC) has provided another valuable channel for information sharing and liaison.

FOCUS FOR 2023-2024

We expect 2023-2024 will be a very busy year for the committee

as the government looks to make the changes to our copyright regime required by the free trade agreements with both the United Kingdom and the EU. The Ministry for Business, Innovation and Employment (MBIE) recently announced that they are developing advice for the incoming government post-election on resuming the review of the Copyright Act in 2024. To help ensure that the library and information sector has a strong voice in the review the committee has prepared a position description for a part-time Copyright Advisor who would be able to lead work on the review. We appreciate the work LIANZA has been doing to secure funding for this position.

Beyond this, the committee will continue to focus on copyright education through updating resources, further webinars and other events. We also aim to keep a brief on developments impacting

copyright and libraries, including the Wai 262 response.

We would like to continue strengthening our relationship with other bodies with similar interests in copyright including Te Rōpū Whakahau, New Zealand Universities Copyright Expert Working Group, InternetNZ, and GLAM sector colleagues.

LIANZA AORAKI

This has been another quiet year for LIANZA Aoraki due to low staffing levels across libraries and the effects of COVID still having an impact on staff energy levels. However, 2023 is the year of the LIANZA conference to be held in Ōtautahi Christchurch. The committee has been active and prepared to commit energy and enthusiasm organising events over the year and meeting nine times.

The 'Journal Club' met twice with discussions on *Al in Libraries and Discouraging Freedom in the Library.* Thank you to both Olga Hemmingsen and Helen Brownlie for facilitating these opportunities to gather and discuss topics relevant to the profession.

A series of neurodiversity workshops for 20 registrants were offered via Zoom over September and content from these workshops was uploaded to LIANZA Connect. A follow-up session was offered in November.

HIGHLIGHTS FROM LIANZA SPECIAL INTEREST COMMUNITIES

LIANZA CAT SIG - CATALOGUING SIG

LIANZA CAT SIG continued to support cataloguers nationally. We have had another quiet year with only one event – the CatSIG talks on Zoom in October. This was a popular event as it allowed cataloguers the flexibility to attend in person or listen to the recording afterwards. Beth Shoemaker and Karen Snow, co-chairs of the Cataloguing Ethics Steering Committee, gave a talk on the Cataloguing Code of Ethics. Sandra McKenzie from the Te Puna Mātauranga o Aotearoa National Library of New Zealand introduced MarcEdit and Anoushka McGuire, also from the National Library, introduced us to the new RDA Toolkit and the National Library's policy statements and supporting documentation.

Through CAT SIG's involvement, the New Zealand cataloguing community contributed directly to the ongoing development of the international cataloguing standard **Resource Description and Access (RDA).** CatSIG provided two representatives to the Oceania RDA Committee (ORDAC), which in turn supported a regional representative on the RDA Steering Committee (RSC).

Sara Sladwick (Waipapa Taumata Rau University of Auckland), Tamsyn Bayliss (Toi o Tāmaki Auckland Art Gallery) and Rebecca Keenan (Kā Kete Wānaka o Ōtepoti Dunedin Public Libraries) were responsible for editing issues of Catapult with content supplied by members. We thank them for helping us keep Catapult going.

LIANZA HEALTH SIG

In June 2022, the health system became one big organisation under the Te Whatu Ora umbrella, leading to a significant change for most health librarians providing services in hospitals. This opened discussions amongst health librarians on how this will affect the way access to resources will be provided and how it can all be brought together to serve the wide range of people now under the Te Whatu Ora umbrella. While health librarians work their way through all of this, they are continuing as usual.

Successful study days were held at Te Whatu Ora - Waitematā North Shore Hospital in Auckland over two days in September 2022. The Waitematā Clinical Library hosted them. The study days were well attended, both in person and online, and despite some initial teething issues, the online aspect seemed to work. This was the first time the study days were held in both formats. Speakers were a mix of Waitematā staff and librarians and covered

various topics, including supporting systematic reviews, what to do when your organisation has been hit by a ransomware attack, well-being strategies, honouring Te Tiriti and addressing accessibility.

In October, the HealthSIG AGM was held over Zoom. This was an excellent option as it allowed more HealthSIG members to attend. Peter Murgatroyd stepped down as convener, Sally Simpson was voted in to replace him, and the secretary became Megan Clark.

LIANZA PACIFIC INFORMATION MANAGEMENT NETWORK SIG (LIANZA PIMN SIG)

FROM LIANZA TREASURER

Tē tōia, tē haumatia. Nothing can be achieved without a plan, a workforce and a way of doing things.

I am pleased to present the financial results for the 2022-2023 financial year as Treasurer of the Library and Information Association of New Zealand Aotearoa (LIANZA) Te Rau Herenga O Aotearoa.

First, I would like to mention our past executive director, Ana Pickering, who recently resigned from her role with LIANZA. Among her many achievements, Ana demonstrated sound financial management. The strong financial position of the organisation stands testament to her dedicated mahi, and I thank Ana for her efforts and her contribution to the future of LIANZA.

Our financial result for the year reflects the uncertainty of the economic climate in which LIANZA is working, with a net loss of \$23,972. This is a stable result for the organisation under the circumstances, particularly in a non-conference financial year.

As expected in the wake of COVID and amid the costof-living crises, our revenue from membership dropped 8% during the year. This reduction was within the conservative forecast set by the Council at the start of the year.

Additional revenue contributing to the overall result came from increased interest in our invested cash reserves and further income received from the LIANZA SLANZA Tertiary Grants partnership. LIANZA Office and Council members continue to provide extensive support and guidance as part of this joint initiative. LIANZA representatives Philip Miles (chair) and Danae Etches have collaborated with representatives from SLANZA as part of this partnership. The second funding round in October 2022 brought the total number of grants approved to 82. The third funding round will be completed by Christmas 2023, with further opportunities to introduce new talent and upskill those already working in the sector.

Revenue from all sources totalled \$419,562 for the year, at a similar level to the last non-conference year in 2020/2021.

Significant effort has been made to minimise the impact of rising inflation on the organisation's operating expenditure. Of note was the move to vacate the LIANZA Office and shift the team to a work-from-home model, allowing for flexibility and cost reduction while preserving the excellent service to members that the team provides.

Despite reporting a financial loss for the year, LIANZA remains in a strong financial position, with sufficient reserves to withstand the current economic climate. It is important, however, that we approach the next financial year with a strategic mindset to take advantage of opportunities that will ensure the ability of LIANZA to thrive in the future.

Moving into the 2023-2024 financial year, bringing our new executive director on board and embedding them into our organisation will be exciting. Together with the Council, they have many opportunities to add value for our members and set LIANZA up for success.

My time on the LIANZA Council will end in June 2024. I approach my final year as Treasurer excited to work with a passionate and dedicated Council to further our strategic plan and ensure the financial stability of LIANZA for generations to come.

I want to express my sincere gratitude to past and present council members and others I have had the pleasure of meeting for the opportunity to be a part of your community.

Statement of Accounting Policies

Library and Information Association of New Zealand Aotearoa For the year ended 30 June 2023

Basis of Preparation

The entity has elected to apply PBE SFR-A (NFP) Public Benefit Entity Simple Format Reporting - Accrual (Not-For-Profit) on the basis that it does not have public accountability and has total annual expenses equal to or less than \$2,000,000. All transactions in the Performance Report are reported using the accrual basis of accounting. The Performance Report is prepared under the assumption that the entity will continue to operate in the foreseeable future.

Presentation Currency

These financial statements are presented in \$NZ Dollars, rounded to the nearest dollar.

Goods and Services Tax (GST)

The entity is registered for GST. All amounts are stated exclusive of goods and services tax (GST) except for accounts payable and accounts receivable which are stated inclusive of GST.

Income Tax

Income tax is accounted for using the taxes payable method. The income tax expense in the Statement of Financial Performance represents the estimated current obligation payable to Inland Revenue in respect of each reporting period after taking full advantage of all deductions and concession permitted.

Bank Accounts and Cash

Bank accounts and cash in the Statement of Cash Flows comprise cash balances and bank balances (including short term deposits) with original maturities of 365 days or less.

Changes in Accounting Policies

There have been no changes in accounting policies. Policies have been applied on a consistent basis with those of the previous reporting period.

Revenue Recognition

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable for the sale of goods and services, to the extent it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the company and revenue can be reliably measured.

Membership income subscription revenue is recognised as income when earned.

Sales of goods are recognised when the goods are sold and delivered to the customer.

Sales of services are recognised in the period by reference to the stage of completion of the transaction at the end of the reporting period.

Interest received is recognised as interest accrues, gross of refundable tax credits received.

Foreign Currencies

Transactions in foreign currencies are converted at the New Zealand rate of exchange ruling at the date of settlement. At balance date outstanding foreign monetary assets and liabilities are translated at the closing rate and variations arising from these transactions are included in the Statement of Financial Performance.

Receivables

Receivables are stated at their estimated realisable value. Bad debts are written off in the year in which they are identified.



Property, Plant and Equipment

Property, plant and equipment and investment property are stated at historical cost less any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. Historical cost includes expenditure directly attributable to the acquisition of assets, and includes the cost of replacements that are eligible for capitalisation when these are incurred.

Depreciation is calculated on a diminishing value basis over the estimated useful life of the asset using depreciation rates published by Inland Revenue.

Creditors and Accrued Expenses

Creditors and accrued expenses are measured at the amount owed.

Employee Costs Payable

A liability for employee costs payable is recognised when an employee has earned the entitlement. These include salaries and wages accrued up to balance date and annual leave earned but not yet taken at balance date.

Funds Held on Behalf

LIANZA receives an administers Funds on Behalf of other entities. These funds are held as liabilities on the Statement of Financial Position.

Income in Advance

Income received but not yet earned is held as a liability on the Statement of Financial Position.

Independent auditor's report

Opinion

In our opinion:

- b) the accompanying performance report presents fairly, in all material respects:
